

Tasmanian Tourism Snapshot

Year ending December 2011

Introduction

The Tasmanian Tourism Snapshot is published every quarter, using the latest figures from the Tasmanian Visitor Survey, the International Visitor Survey and the National Visitor Survey, to provide you with a statistical overview about international and interstate visitors to Tasmania, as well as intrastate travel by Tasmanians. Information about these three surveys is contained at the back of the Snapshot.

Total Visitation to Tasmania (Source: Tasmanian Visitor Survey)

Key Results:

- For the year ending December 2011 there were 862,400 visitors, down 5% from 904,000 for the previous year.
- Total nights decreased by 8% to 7.67 million.
- Visitor expenditure decreased by 4% to \$1.460 billion.
- The number of interstate visitors to Tasmania decreased by 4% to 745,800 (was 779,900).

Summary:

- In terms of visitor numbers from Tasmania's key markets, Victoria decreased by 2%, New South Wales decreased by 6%, and Queensland increased by 2%.
- Holiday visitors decreased by 7% for the year ending December 2011, holiday nights decreased by 8% and holiday expenditure remained steady.
- VFR visitors decreased by 4% for the year. The number of nights VFR visitors spent in Tasmania decreased by 1% while VFR expenditure decreased by 8%.
- The total number of visitors holidaying in Tasmania during the year ending December 2011 was 360,000, down 7% compared to the previous year (was 385,500).
- The total number of nights spent by holiday visitors to Tasmania for the year ending December 2011 was 3.5 million, down 8% from the previous year (was 3.8 million).
- Holiday visitor expenditure remained steady to \$986.80 million (was \$988.40 million).
- Of all visitors, 360,000 (down 7%) were on holiday, 250,600 (down 4%) were visiting friends or relatives, 153,600 (down 10%) were on business, and 35,400 (up 9%) were travelling to attend a conference or convention.
- For the year ending December 2011, data from the TVS for the five marketing zones reported the following changes in visitor numbers: Hobart and Surrounds, down 6%; Launceston, Tamar Valley and the North, down 5%; Western Wilderness, down 10%; North West, down 12%; and East Coast, down 10%.
- For the year ending December 2011, 86% of all visitors to Tasmania travelled by scheduled air services

and 14% travelled by sea. The total number of visitors travelling by scheduled air was down 4% and sea services was down 8% from the previous year.

Interstate Visitation to Tasmania (Source: Tasmanian Visitor Survey)

- The total number of interstate visitors to Tasmania for the year ending December 2011 was 745,800, down 4% from 779,900 the previous year.
- The total number of nights spent by interstate visitors to Tasmania for the year ending December 2011 was 6.00 million, down 8% from the previous year (was 6.53 million).
- Interstate visitor expenditure decreased by 5% to \$1.23 billion (was \$1.29 billion in the year ending December 2010).
- Of all interstate visitors, 286,400 were on holiday (down 6%), 228,000 were visiting friends or relatives (down 4%), 143,300 were on business (down 10%), and 32,200 were travelling to attend a conference or convention (up 8%).
- In terms of visitation to Tasmania from the key interstate markets, Victoria decreased by 2% to 337,400, NSW decreased by 6% to 173,600, and Queensland increased by 2% to 115,700 (Table 4). Together, these markets accounted for 84% of interstate visitation in the year ending December 2011.

International Visitation (Source: International Visitor Survey)

Summary – Australia:

- A total of 5.44 million international visitors visited the country in the year ending December 2011, showing no significant change from the year ending December 2010.
- Holiday visitors to Australia decreased by 4% to 2.39 million, while VFR visitors increased by 1% to 1.34 million.
- International visitor nights spent in Australia increased by 4% to 194.7 million.
- Total expenditure by international visitors in Australia for the year ending December 2011 increased by 4% to \$18.3 billion¹ (including package expenditure). Holiday spend was \$6.2 billion (including package expenditure) for the year, down 1% from the year ending December 2010.
- For Australia's three largest source markets, the following changes to visitor numbers to Australia were recorded: New Zealand, up 1%; United Kingdom, down 6%; and the USA, down 3%.

Summary – Tasmania:

- Tasmania received 149,800 international visitors during the year ending December 2011, up 6% from 142,000 the previous year.
- The number of nights international visitors spent in Tasmania decreased by 4% to 2.86 million.
- Expenditure by international visitors decreased by 9% to \$254 million².
- Holiday visitors to Tasmania increased by 10% to 105,700, while VFR visitors increased by 2% to 29,900.
- Visitor nights decreased by 4% to 2.86 million, and the average length of stay for international visitors in Tasmania decreased by 9% to 19 nights. Holiday nights increased by 23% to 1.20 million, while the average length of stay for holiday visitors increased by 12% to 11 nights.

- The average spend per international visitor (including package expenditure) in Tasmania decreased by 14% to \$1,696 (was \$1,965) during the year ending December 2011, while spend per night decreased by 5% to \$89 (was \$94).
- For Tasmania's three largest source markets, the following changes to visitor numbers to the State were recorded: United Kingdom, up 7%; New Zealand, down 5%; and the USA, down 1%.
- Tasmania's share of all international visitors to Australia for the year ending December 2011 was 2.8%, compared with 2.6% for the year ending December 2010.

Intrastate Visitation³ (National Visitor Survey)

- In the year ending December 2011, the number of intrastate day trips in Tasmania increased by 1% to 4.34 million, whilst intrastate overnight trips increased by 9% to 1.1 million compared to the same period in the previous year.
- The number of overnight intrastate holiday trips in Tasmania increased by 5%, VFR increased by 13%, and overnight business trips increased by 9% in the year ending December 2011.
- Total spend by overnight intrastate visitors in Tasmania increased by 7% to \$317 million for the year ending December 2011.

Quarter ending December 2011

The TVS reports the following key findings for visitors during the October-December 2011 quarter.

- The total number of visitors to Tasmania for the December quarter 2011 was 219,900, showing no significant change from 219,300 the previous year (Fig. 1).

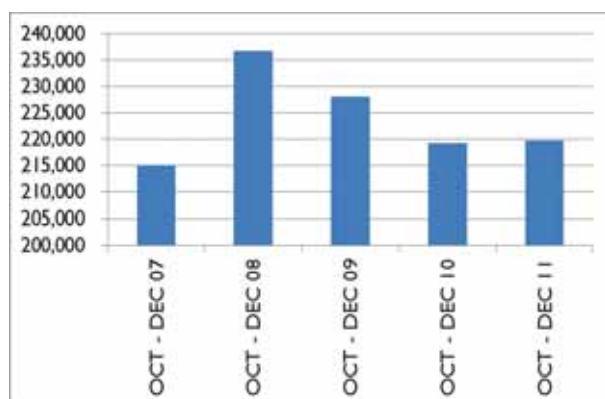


Fig. 2. Total Nights by Quarter*

- The total number of nights spent by visitors to Tasmania for the December quarter 2011 decreased by 4% to 1.80 million (was 1.86 million) (Fig. 2).

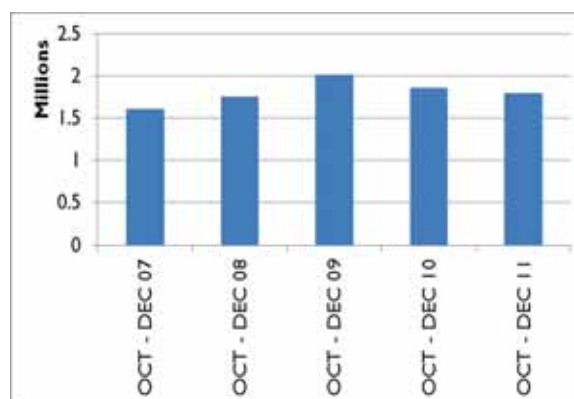


Fig. 3. Total Expenditure (\$ millions) by Quarter*

- Visitor expenditure was \$350 million, down 9% from the same quarter of the previous year (was \$385.3 million) (Fig. 3).

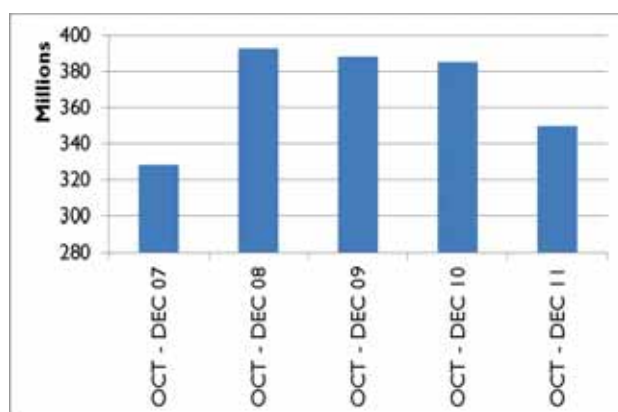
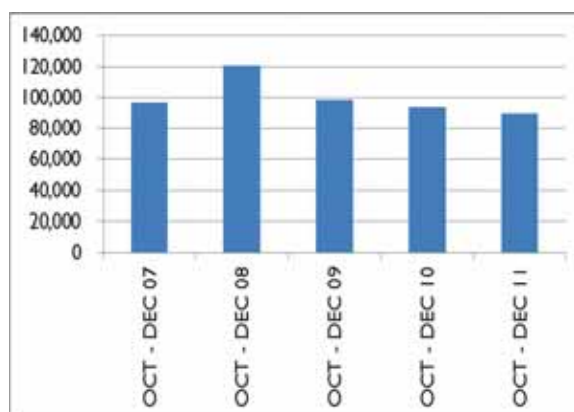


Fig. 4. Total Holiday Visitors by Quarter*

- Of all visitors for the quarter, 89,600 (down 4%) were on holiday, 65,700 (up 4%) were visiting friends or relatives, 35,700 (down 12%) were on business, and 15,000 (up 83%) were travelling to attend a conference or convention (Fig. 4).

Fig. 1. Total Visitors to Tasmania by Quarter*

Where do the statistics come from?

Tasmanian Visitor Survey (TVS)

The TVS is an exit survey designed to provide a profile of the characteristics, travel behaviour and expenditure of international and domestic visitors to Tasmania. It is nationally acknowledged as the most reliable source of statistical data about visitors to Tasmania, being based on a sample of more than 9,000 visitors per year. As an island, Tasmania has a natural advantage over other destinations when it comes to surveys of this type, because visitors can be more accurately counted as they depart via air and sea ports.

International Visitor Survey (IVS)

The IVS is administered by Tourism Research Australia. The IVS is the most comprehensive source of information on international visitors to Australia. The survey gathers information from visitors about, among other things; the number of nights they stayed in Australia, travel arrangements, reasons for visiting, places visited, information sources they used to find out about Australia prior to leaving home, impressions of aspects of Australia, income earned and expenditure on the trip. The IVS samples 40,000 departing, short-term international travellers in the departure lounges of eight international airports across Australia - Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Cairns, Perth, Adelaide, Darwin and the Gold Coast.

National Visitor Survey (NVS)

The NVS is also administered by Tourism Research Australia. The NVS measures the characteristics and travel patterns of domestic tourists within Australia, including intrastate day and overnight travel. The survey results come from telephone interviews conducted with an annual sample of 120,000 Australian residents. The survey collects details about their recent travel for day trips, trips involving overnight stays and overseas travel. The NVS provides the only source of information about day and overnight travel by Tasmanians in their own state.

Why the TVS and IVS figures don't match up?

Each survey is conducted by a different organisation which uses different sampling and 'weighting' methods to determine total numbers. As a result, the statistics from each survey will give differing results for identical subjects and are unlikely to tally if added together.
